

T-Seps 2.0 Installation Directions

T-Seps 2.0 is fairly easy to install. (Your download version may be 2.0.x, 2.2.x or other “build number” but the program is still called T-Seps 2.0.) This document will help with first time users and people updating from a previous version. The Free Trial download version of T-Seps is a fully functioning version that is locked to expire in 20 days. If you own T-Seps this is also the version you want to install. You will be asked to be Authorized again. See the details below. Photoshop must be closed during the installation.

Important note: The latest version of T-Seps has been changed to be more secure and the current manual may or may not reflect these changes. In certain instances you will NOT see the T-Seps plug-in in Photoshop in the usual location of *File/Automate*. You do not run it from there but in the past it had to be there. We have changed that so it will often now be hidden from view.

Windows Users

Directions for new users who have never installed T-Seps or who are installing it on a new computer.

If you are installing T-Seps for the first time or putting it on a new computer then the installation is very straight forward. You should download the most current T-Seps manual from the download page at www.T-BizNetwork.com/downloads/. Refer to **Section 4** which starts on page 13 of the manual for all the details. You simply double-click on the *T-Seps20.exe* file (this file may also be named *T-Seps20Installer.exe*) and it does 80% of the installation for you. Other than doing minor changes to how Photoshop displays color in the *Color Settings* window – the installation is very quick and easy. These steps are all explained in the manual.

If the installation was successful you should get a T-Seps pop-up window when you open Photoshop with **Try/Authorize**. If you are a trial user simply press **Try**. If you own T-Seps and are putting it on a new computer click on **Authorize** and send the *Request Code* to support@tbiznetwork.com.

Directions for Windows owners of T-Seps wishing to upgrade - or older free trial users who are giving it a second look.

If you are upgrading from an earlier version of T-Seps or have installed a free trial and want to give it a second look then you will need to uninstall the previous version of T-Seps **BEFORE YOU RUN THE INSTALLER** *T-Seps20.exe*. There may or may not be an automated uninstall routine depending on what version of T-Seps you have and what operating system. To see if there is an uninstall routine go to the *Start* button and find the *T-Seps* program listing. Look for an *Uninstall* or *Remove* button there. If you find this simply click on it.

In some cases this routine will NOT remove the entire program. Please double-check this by following the uninstall routine next.

Remove T-Seps main folder

Go to your C: drive and find a folder called *TSeps*. Delete this entire folder.

Remove actual plug-in files from all versions of Photoshop

You may or may not have more than one version of Photoshop installed – depending on your computer type and version of Photoshop. You actually may not know if you have more than one version. Newer versions of Photoshop install both a 32-bit version and a 64-bit version. The 32-bit version is installed in an *Adobe* folder in a folder on your C: drive called *ProgramFiles(x86)*. 64-bit versions of Photoshop are installed in an *Adobe* folder on your C: drive in a folder called *ProgramFiles*. You need to remove the actual T-Seps plug-in from all versions of Photoshop.

T-Seps has two plug-in files and each one has a 32-bit and 64-bit version. These files are called:

T-Seps32.8li

T-Seps64.8li

T-SepsCustomIndex32.8li

T-SepsCustomIndex64.8li

These files are automatically installed in a folder called *Automate* in your *Adobe* folder on your computer. The path to this folder is typically: *C:/ProgramFiles (or ProgramFilesx86), Adobe/Adobe Photoshop version/Plug-ins/Automate*. You must remove any T-Seps plug-ins in this folder. Make sure to do this for both 32-bit and 64-bit versions.

Install T-Seps

For the directions above for a new install of T-Seps on a Windows computer.

Mac Users

Directions for new users who have never installed T-Seps or who are installing it on a new computer.

If you are installing T-Seps for the first time or putting it on a new computer then the installation is very straight forward. You should download the most current T-Seps manual from the download page at www.T-BizNetwork.com/downloads/. Refer to **Section 4** which starts on page 13 of the manual for all the details. You simply double-click on the *T-Seps20-64.Installer.dmg.zip* file that you downloaded. It will need to be unzipped and then the typical Mac installer package needs to be run. It does 80% of the installation for you. Other than doing minor changes to how Photoshop displays color in the *Color Settings* window – the installation is very quick and easy. These steps are all explained in the manual.

If the installation was successful you should get a T-Seps pop-up window when you open Photoshop with **Try/Authorize**. If you are a trial user simply press **Try**. If you own T-Seps and are putting it on a new computer click on **Authorize** and send the *Request Code* to support@tbiznetwork.com.

Directions for Mac owners of T-Seps wishing to upgrade - or older free trial users who are giving it a second look.

Remove T-Seps main folder

Go to your Mac Hard Disk and find a folder called *TSeps*. Delete this entire folder.

Remove actual plug-in files from all versions of Photoshop

You may or may not have more than one version of Photoshop installed – depending on your computer type and version of Photoshop. You actually may not know if you have more than one version. Newer versions of Photoshop install both a 32-bit version and a 64-bit version. These versions are in your *Applications* folder in a folder called *Adobe*. You need to remove the actual T-Seps plug-in package from all versions of Photoshop. You will find these files under the *Adobe Photoshop* version in a folder called *Plug-ins/Automate*.

Depending on your version of Photoshop and if you are running both 32-bit and 64-bit versions you may or may not have all of these files. Any “T-Seps” plug-in packages you find in the *Automate* folder need to be deleted.

These are typically named:

T-Seps32.plugin

T-Seps64.plugin

T-SepsCustomIndex32.plugin

T-SepsCustomIndex64.plugin

You should then empty your *Trash*.

Install T-Seps

Follow the directions above for installing a new version of T-Seps on a Mac computer.

Windows and Mac

Updated Security Program

Our older security/anti-piracy routine would generate a series of strange words called a *challenge* that you would email in to be unlocked. We no longer use this system. The new program generates a simple number called a *Request Code*. If you are a current user of T-Seps and try to authorize T-Seps and still get the string of strange words then you have missed a step in uninstalling the older version. You should go back to the *Automate* folders and make sure you have removed all versions of T-Seps.

We do not unlock/authorize trial users. If you are a trial user and you wish to extend the trial a few more days send email to support@tbiznetwork.com with a request for a trial extension.
